
BEACH HUNT

There are lots of interesting things to discover on the beach very near home. Why not take a look this summer and see if you can find what we've found?




What do you think these are?

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

You can even get to Middleton Sands – with the most rubbish we've ever seen - by walking through Heysham Nature Reserve via the road to Ocean Edge. For a long explore there is Sunderland Point... Make this a day's exploring with a picnic.

Further along are the beaches around Bay Cottage playground, Heysham Head and Half Moon Bay.

Past the Battery along Sandylands Parade is a good hunting ground for riches and rubbish. You can paddle in the remains of the old sea water pool - but watch out for the mud!
